No Funds for Traffic Calming This Year

We have learned that Boulevard Manor's streets were not selected by County staff to be among the five traffic calming projects in this year's funding cycle. Concerned members of our community applied to the County for traffic calming assistance on nine of our neighborhood streets.

As you may remember, the County collected traffic data on these streets last Spring. In considering the applications, County staff "rated" the streets according to a fairly complex formula used to set priorities. Because most streets included in Boulevard Manor's proposal did not rank highly, based on this formula, the County chose to fund other projects.

While the County's decision is disappointing, staff have pointed out that the data suggest that some streets in Boulevard Manor have a ranking high enough to make them good candidates to be funded next year. The most highly ranked streets in our neighborhood were:

- N. Manchester Street north 8th St. (Score of 80)
- N. Manchester Street south of 8th St. and north of 4th Rd. (Score of 66)
- The Route 50 Service Road between N. Manchester and Nottingham Streets. (Score of 64)
- North Livingston St. north of 6th St. (Score of 56)
- 4th Road east of Montague. (Score of 52)
- N. Montague St. south of 4th St. (Score of 51)
- N. Livingston St. south of 6th St. (Score of 50)

The projects funded by the County this year all ranked above 60.

County Board Responds to BMCA

In late July, the Arlington County Board addressed some of the concerns that the BMCA had communicated:

Red light runners: the Board noted that the Arlington County Police Department is in the process of studying locations throughout the County where the red-light enforcement cameras would be most effective. The study includes the intersection of N. Manchester Street and Arlington Boulevard.

More parking for the soccer field at Bluemont Park: the Board stated a willingness to revisit the issue of an additional parking lot off N. Manchester Street if demand for parking indicates such a need.

Proposed Manchester interchange: the Board defended their position favoring development of an overpass to carry N. Manchester St. over Arlington Blvd. The Board's position is based on forecasts of 2020 traffic that were part of a 1986 plan. The Board admits that the county's street plan needs to be updated. They also allow that "Staff turnover and the continued emergence of localized issues have stymied plans to move ahead quickly..." The Board has assured BMCA of opportunities to participate in public meetings regarding re-master planning processes for transportation and parks of concern to our neighborhood.

Plans for Water Main Construction Modified

Construction of the replacement 16-inch water main serving our area will begin this month. The initial work will be at N. Larrimore St. to enable Washington Gas to upgrade its gas line. The new schedule means that work in our neighborhood (8th Rd., Manchester St., and 5th St.) will not occur until this coming winter.

The project is expected to last six months, with the water main replacement proceeding at 100 to 200 feet per day. One lane of traffic is expected to be maintained with no parking allowed on streets during actual construction. We can also expect some gas and water interruptions. This situation will have a major impact on traffic at Ashlawn Elementary School as well as some of our neighborhood streets. The County plans to notify residents with additional details.

Ashlawn Boundary Changes Under Consideration

A new elementary school, now under construction on the site next to Kenmore Middle School, is scheduled for occupancy in Fall 2001. Arlington Public Schools is therefore reviewing the Ashlawn Elementary School boundaries. Look for more discussions this fall. In addition, the County will be considering possible names for the new school. One Bid Received for Bluemont Park Bypass Trail

In June, the County received only one bid for construction of the proposed new section of the bike trail around Bluemont Park. The bid exceeded the engineer's estimate for the project. Permits and final approvals for the project are pending.
